



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
# RHYTHMIC BASIC 5

(SEE EXAMPLE).



# THE SLIDE TECHNIQUE

57 / 58 / 59 / 60 / 61

It is possible to play slide guitar in standard tuning (E A D G B E), but the open string tuning will give you the typical blues sound.


## Open Tuning

The goal is to tune the guitar in a way that when the open strings are played simultaneously, it gives a chord.

THE MOST USED OPEN TUNINGS ARE:

D = ( D A D F# A D ).

G = ( D G D G B D ).





# BLUES GUITAR
